

Petoskey District Library and WCMU Hold Film Preview: “THE VIETNAM WAR”

A Landmark Documentary Event by Ken Burns and Lynn Novick

Petoskey MI – The **Petoskey District Library** and **WCMU Public Media** will host a free film preview of **THE VIETNAM WAR**, a landmark documentary series by Ken Burns and Lynn Novick, on **Monday, Sept. 11 at 7 p.m.** The event will occur at the Carnegie Building at 451 E. Mitchell Street, The evening includes a speaker from “Forgotten Eagles” in addition to the film preview. Earlier in the day, WCMU staff will be on hand to record Vietnam vets or their family members reading letters sent home from the war.

THE VIETNAM WAR, a new 10-part, 18-hour documentary film series directed by Ken Burns and Lynn Novick premieres on WCMU Public Television Sunday, Sept. 17 at 8 p.m. The first five episodes will air nightly from Sunday, Sept. 17, through Thursday, Sept. 21, and the final five episodes will air nightly from Sunday, Sept. 24, through Thursday, Sept. 28. Each episode will premiere at 8:00 p.m. with a repeat broadcast immediately following the premiere. An overnight broadcast of each episode will air at 4:00 a.m., Sept. 18 – 22 and Sept. 25 – 29. Beginning Tuesday, Oct. 3 at 9:00 p.m., the series will air again, one episode per week through Nov. 28.

The series will be accompanied by a **public engagement program** from WCMU Public Media, including free film preview events and the creation of a travelling exhibit, “Letters Home.” WCMU is asking that veterans and their families submit letters and photos sent home during the war for placement in the exhibit. After travelling to sites around Michigan, the exhibit will become a permanent piece in the Michigan Military Heritage Museum’s Vietnam collection. WCMU will also produce video and audio recordings of individuals reading the material they submit. Recordings will be selected to air on WCMU Public Media and reside at www.wcmu.org. WCMU Public Radio is involved in this engagement effort as well weaving Vietnam War-themed content into their music and news programming.

MORE ABOUT “THE VIETNAM WAR” TELEVISION SERIES

In an immersive narrative, Burns and Novick tell the epic story of the Vietnam War as it has never before been told on film. **THE VIETNAM WAR** features testimony from nearly 100 witnesses, including many Americans who fought in the war and others who opposed it, as well as Vietnamese combatants and civilians from both the winning and losing sides.

“The Vietnam War was a decade of agony that took the lives of more than 58,000 Americans,” Burns said. “Not since the Civil War have we as a country been so torn apart. There wasn’t an American alive then who wasn’t affected in some way — from those who fought and sacrificed in the war, to families of service members and POWs, to those who protested the war in open conflict with their government and fellow citizens. More than 40 years after it ended, and we are still arguing about why it went wrong, who was to blame and whether it was all worth it.”

THE VIETNAM WAR features new, original music written and recorded by Academy Award-winning composers Trent Reznor and Atticus Ross. The film also features new music arranged and performed by Grammy Award-winning cellist Yo-Yo Ma and The Silk Road Ensemble

The series also features more than 120 popular songs that define the era, including tracks from The Beatles, The Rolling Stones, Bob Dylan, Jimi Hendrix, Simon & Garfunkel, Janis Joplin, Ben E. King, Phil Ochs, Donovan, Johnny Cash and many more.
